Thoughts From Doug


I imagine that most of the Hardwick Baptist family is like me. By that, I mean you likely did not anticipate the longevity of the drastic implications of COVID-19. While most other countries in the developed world (specifically European countries) observed a longer, more rigid quarantine at the beginning, in America we opted to "get things going" sooner. As a result, we are facing much more severe consequences, with the severity of the virus lingering. When historians and sociologists write about this part of American history, no doubt they will critique how we displayed an undenying level of selfishness, oftentimes masked as "personal freedom." Indeed, we all need to read the history of the generation of our grandfathers and grandmothers, great grandfathers and great grandmothers, who made all kinds of sacrifices, both on behalf of our country and our European allies, in order to secure victory in World War II. I can only hope that the generation to which my daughters belong will, as they mature and have opportunities for influence, make the qualities of altruism and selflessness prevalent once again. I hope they will be more like the Greatest Generation and less like the generation that is raising them.

Throughout the history of Christ's Church, the most profound spiritual writers and thinkers have repeatedly taught about the dark night of the soul. That is, they have discussed that, if we are serious about growing in our relationship with Christ, it is essential that we face periods of darkness. That darkness may be precipitated by personal tragedy or loss; by physical, mental, or emotional suffering; by disillusionment with people we trusted and depended on; or by a crisis of faith that may lead us to doubt all we ever believed about God. Whatever the source, these are life circumstances which cause us to feel as if we are in an extended period of darkness. Much like the reality of emotional depression that is beyond one's control, the dark night of the soul could be explained as a time of spiritual depression. In the Bible, we see examples of the dark night in essentially all of the lives of the great saints. For Jesus, that dark night could be considered his literal dark night in Gethsemane. For Paul, his thorn in the flesh, his beatings and persecutions, and his three days blinded prior to Ananias' visit. If we try to avoid or ignore such periods in our life, we will stagnate in our spiritual growth. But if we honestly traverse them, paying attention to the darkness and what God has to teach us, we will emerge on the other side into new light with an increased dependence on God and more love for others, less concern for ourselves.

So maybe for this generation of Americans—at least for those who seek to follow Christ—this time will function as a *dark night of our soul*. We can remain stagnant, trying to experience as much comfort and familiarity with the past as possible. Or we can pay attention to what God is trying to do, and we will experience this time as a chrysalis in a cocoon, waiting to see the transformation God performs in our lives when we trust God to truly make all thing new—beginning with us.


