
Thoughts From Doug

I started off today (Tuesday) by reading our Scripture readings for the week as part of my morning prayer. I typically have read the texts for the coming Sunday by Monday night, or Tuesday at the latest. I will read them, pray and think about them, and see which one in particular calls me to preach on it. Then I will do the study of the test, make sure I know the background and context of it, so that any contemporary applications I may make in my sermon are faithful to the text. In our preaching classes in seminary, we were reminded that this is an important aspect to faithful, reliable preaching. We were taught that it is the job of preachers to help the listener to more fully appreciate the biblical story. It is tempting for some preachers to make it all about oratory—more of a performance in the pulpit. When the preaching task is done in this manner, there is the temptation to turn preaching into a form of entertainment—to make it more about the preacher than the Word. Sort of like having a teacher in school whom you loved because of their personality or sense of humor, or charm—but you cannot recall one thing that teacher taught you. On the contrary, a preacher who is faithful to his/her call to ministry in the manner of Christ seeks to become a servant to the biblical text, very much like an archeologist becomes a servant to history and ancient artifacts. In seminary we had to take courses in Christian Theology, Christian Ethics, Church History, Christian Philosophy, Old Testament, New Testament, Hebrew, Greek, Christian Education, Personal Counseling, Spiritual Formation, Preaching, Evangelism, Church Administration, Leadership—along with many other more specialized courses. All of these courses serve as tools that are meant to be faithfully used in the preacher's toolbox. That is quite different than preparing a sermon that is designed to impress or entertain people. Instead, those tools are utilized to help uncover the specific setting into which the Bible was first written; to pay attention to the current culture and social dynamics in which the church finds itself; and then to attempt to show that God's Word is ever fresh and relevant as it speaks to today. Of course, the key component is all of this is the Holy Spirit. If we are faithful to praying and listening for the Spirit in our daily lives, and approaching the Bible each day from a receptive heart of listening for a word, then our Spirits are better prepared to receive a word at church that speaks to us personally. Just as a preacher has to work each day on skills of study, prayer, listening, remembering, writing—so every worshiper needs to be working on their daily skills of spiritual receptivity. When we are faithful to do that, year after year, we will find that:1.) we are experiencing an ever deeper daily worship life; and 2.) Sunday worship becomes a time which we immerse ourselves into the Bible passage that is shared, trusting God's Spirit to reveal to us a message addressed uniquely to us. When we approach the worship service with this mindset, we are more likely to leave worship a different person than when we arrived.


